Threats, Attacks, and Vulnerabilities Practice Tests

One of the most crucial areas that a security professional needs to have knowledge about is the type of attacks that there are and the ways that these attacks can be mitigated so that your company is less vulnerable to attacks. The CompTIA exam breaks this examination topic into different areas.

The first area we look at is the types of malware that exist, such as basic viruses, worms, trojans, ransomware, adware, spyware, rootkits, keyloggers, logic bombs, and backdoor.

Next, we will compare and contrast the different types of attacks. This area is immense. We will also look at the different types of social engineering attacks, where the individual is seen as the weak link that the attacker will try to exploit. These attacks range from phishing, spear phishing, whaling, vishing, tailgating, impersonating, dumpster diving, shoulder surfing, hoaxes, and watering-hole attacks. IT professionals need to be familiar with social engineering attacks such as authority, intimidation, consensus, and urgency.

We are also going to look at application service attacks, such as DoS, DDoS, man-in-the-middle, buffer overflow, integer overflow, SQL injection, XSS, XSRF, amplification, DNS poisoning, ARP poisoning, domain hijacking, zero-day virus, replay, and pass-the-hash attacks. We will also be looking at hijacking and related attacks, such as clickjacking, session hijacking, typosquatting, and driver manipulation. We will also look at wireless attacks, ranging from evil twin, rogue access point, jamming, WPS, bluejacking, bluesnarfing, RFID, NFC, and disassociation. No exam would be complete without cryptographic attacks, such as birthday, rainbow-table, dictionary, brute-force, collision, and downgrade attacks.

You need to know and identify the motivation of the threat actors that you will face, and these range from the script kiddie with little knowledge to the politically motivated hacktivist, nation-states, advanced persistent threats, competitors, and the most dangerous malicious insider threat. Every security professional will need to know about penetration tests that can be intrusive and cause damage, such as the black, white, and gray box penetration testers to the non-credentialed, credentialed, false positive, and real time monitoring. We need to look at the impact of vulnerabilities, such as race conditions, end-of-life systems, lack of vendor support, default configurations, untrained users, handling and setting up errors, undocumented assets, zero-day viruses, and key management.

This publication is not a study guide, but gives you additional examination revision material so that your knowledge base can be at its highest when you take the test. Everyone has different ways of learning, and hopefully, with four different formats, everyone should be catered for.

Before you begin each set of tests, you need to keep a sheet of paper so that areas that you get wrong or are guessing at are written down to help identify the weak areas that you need to revise before testing.

After the test, there is a *Cheat Sheet* section, containing a shortened version of the most relevant information that you need to know to pass this test.

Cryptographic Attacks

- Birthday – hash-collision attack; digital signatures vulnerable
- Rainbow tables – precomputed list of passwords and hashes; used for hash-collision attacks
- Dictionary – password; prevented by using a random character in your password or misspelling your password
- Brute force – every available combination; prevents account lockout low value or salt password
- Collision – matches hashes
- Downgrade – uses legacy SSL rather than TLS; POODLE is a classic example
- Weak implementation – uses WEP; better to use WPA2-CCMP as it is the strongest

Threat Actors

- Script kiddie – purchases scripts and programs, probably from the dark web
- Hacktivist – politically motivated agent
- Organized crime – profit-driven agent who will blackmail you
- Nation state/APT – foreign government agent
- Insider – known as a malicious insider; hardest to detect
- Competitors – steals your trade secrets; beats you to market with your product

Penetration Testing

- Intrusive – can cause damage
- Black box – knows nothing
- White box – knows everything
- Gray box – has at least one piece of information—for example, a password or diagram
- Fuzzing – enters random characters into an application for spurious results; black-/white-box pen testers use it

- Error handling – customer side makes error small; IT support error needs all information

- Resource exhaustion – running CPU at 100% or running out of memory
- Untrained users – not complying with policies
- Key management – ensures keys signed in and out each day

Technologies and Tools Practice Tests

A security professional must have knowledge of the different tools that they have at their disposal to identify threats and attacks on the network.

The first area that we will look at is installing and configuring network components such as different types of firewalls. We'll then look at how VPNs operate with their different components and operate with different scenarios. We will also look at NIPS, NIDS, HIPS and HIDS, proxy servers, load balancers, wireless access points, mail gateways, and SIEM systems. We will also look at using DLP to prevent sensitive information from leaving the network, and finally, using NAC to ensure that the devices used for remote connections to the network are fully patched.

Next, we will be using the appropriate tools to access the security posture of a system, including protocol analyzers, network scanners, wireless scanners, and password crackers. We will look at data sanitization tools such as shredding, pulverizing, pulping, and degaussing. Security teams need to know about honeypots to determine the attack methods being used so we can mitigate against them. As a security administrator, you need to be familiar with command-line tools, different backup utilities, and the different types of scans (ranging from vulnerability scans to the more intrusive scans that would cause damage to your systems).

We need to be able to analyze and interpret the output from security tools such as HIDS/HIPS.

A security administrator needs the ability to troubleshoot common security issues such as certificate issues, unauthorized software, and different types of threats, including social engineering. We also need to troubleshoot applications and know when to use whitelists and blacklists.

A security administrator needs to familiarize themselves with deploying mobile devices securely, including connection methods, mobile device management concepts, different deployment models, understanding rooting/jailbreaking, and sideloading of applications.

A good knowledge of implementing secure protocols such as S/MIME, PGP, SRTP, SFTP, and securing data in transit using TLS and SSL.

Architecture and Design Practice Tests

You need to understand that policies are derived from regulatory frameworks, but you must have knowledge of non-regulatory frameworks and national and international laws. Also, some insights into vendor and user guides and knowing how the defense in depth model operates is mandatory.

The second area that we must have knowledge of is how to implement a secure network, including intranets, extranets, DMZ, NAT, and the use of honeypots. Network segmentation needs to be designed and the correct placement of security devices such as firewalls, NIPS, and NIDS to ensure your networks are safe.

The next area where expertise is required is the rolling out of devices such as laptops and ensuring that they are hardened to protect the data residing on them. We will look at strong passwords, screen locks, and device encryption to protect data at rest. The security of embedded systems such as IoT items ranging from wearable technology, refrigerators, and home automation are vital as there is an ever-increasing use for these devices.

Companies will create many bespoke applications by using a secure software development life cycle from the development phase through testing and staging. They will use a white box pen tester that will evaluate the application before rolling them into production. Knowledge of secure coding techniques is required.

Two more areas that are evolving are virtualization and cloud services. Due to this, you must be aware of a virtual network's need for sandboxing, snapshots, and attacks on virtual machines, including VM escape. Security professionals need to know which cloud model is the most appropriate to use in different scenarios ranging from private, public and so on.

Last but not least, physical security controls such as cable locks, mantraps air gaps, biometric systems, security guards, and the use of cameras and CCTV will be tested in the Security+ exam.

Identity and Access Management Practice Tests

Then, we need to look at account policy enforcement such as password history, length, complexity, reuse, account lockouts, disabling accounts, and account expiry.

6 Risk Management

Most companies will have a cybersecurity team to deal with the increasing amounts of cyber crime and one of the key areas that they will adopt to protect the company is risk management.

In this chapter, we will first look at the importance of policies, plans, and procedures that need to be in place to help to protect an organization. We will look at standard operating procedures, agreement types, personnel management including background checks, exit interviews, NDA, and general security procedures.

Next, we will look at Business Impact Analysis concepts such as RTO, RPO, MTTR, and MTBF followed by the impact of mission essential functions, single point of failures, and the impact of disaster recovery.

A security IT professional needs to know about risk management processes and concepts. They need to know the different types of threat actors, how the complete risk registers, and different risk assessments such as qualitative and quantitative. Good knowledge of the different types of penetration testing and how it differs from vulnerability scanning is essential. We need to evaluate risk by looking different aspect relating to cost such as SLE, ARO and ALE. BIA needs to look at RPO/RTO.

Once the professional knows the theory behind risk assessment, they need to look at their ability to respond to incidents, by invoking the various incident response plans and procedures. When dealing with incidents, the security professional needs to know the basic concepts of forensics such as order of volatility, collecting evidence, and implementing chain of custody.

Lastly, the sanitizing and destruction of different types of data from paper waste to the removal and destruction of hard drives and classified and unclassified documents is crucial to ensure that hardware items that are disposed of and do not contain any company data.

The cheat sheet is a condensed format of the main facts that you need to know before taking the exam. We must learn the exam concepts and not just the answers to a bank of questions.

## Risk Treatments

- Avoidance – risk deemed too high. Avoid activity.
- Acceptance – risk too low – do not mitigate
- Mitigation – reduce the risk; for example, anti-virus on laptop
- Transference – transfer risk to a third party; for example, outsourcing, car insurance

## Risk Assessment

- Stage 1 – identify the asset – determine how it is treated and handled
- Quantitative – measurement of loss expressed in a number format
- Qualitative – grading risk as high, medium, or low
- SLE – single loss of an item
- ARO – number of losses in a year
- ALE –  $SLE \times ARO =$  annual losses in a year
- Residual risk – remaining risk after mitigation

## Personnel Management

- Mandatory vacations – employee takes a holiday; the employer discovers fraud or theft
- Job rotation – trains the staff also detect fraud or theft
- Separation of duties – no one person completes the whole transaction
- Exit interview – find reasons for leaving the company
- Off-boarding – returning your company equipment on exit
- **Non-Disclosure Agreement (NDA)** – legal agreement to not discuss company business

## Business Impact Analysis

- RPO – the amount of time you can be without data, acceptable downtime
- RTO – returning to full operation after a disaster
- MTTR – time to repair
- MTBF – time between failures; measures reliability of a system
- Single point of failure – one item, if it fails, takes the system down

## Forensics

- Stage 1 – hard drive – take a forensic copy
- Stage 1 – computer – take a system image
- Order of volatility – collect perishable evidence first
- Record time offset – regional time of evidence that is collected
- Time normalization – putting the record time offsets in sequence
- Chain of custody – who collected and has handled the evidence, should not have a gap
- Rapidly expanding virus – isolate or quarantine immediately

## Recovery Sites

- Hot – manned with all data up to date, most expensive site
- Warm – manned data maybe 3 hours out of date
- Cold – water and electricity – no equipment, cheapest site

## Data Destruction

- Hard drive – shred first, then pulverize, then degauss
- Paper – pulp first, shred second
- Paper – classified – use a burning bag, obtain destruction certificate

35. You can use 802.1x on a managed switch where the legitimate devices use a certificate. This way the 802.1x can validate the device that it lets connect to the switch and rogue devices will be rejected.

41. The most difficult threat actor to detect is the insider threat, sometimes called a malicious insider. He is already inside your network legitimately and therefore is more difficult to track.

You can prevent this by disabling IP broadcasts on the border router.

54. DNSSEC encrypts the DNS traffic to prevent DNS poisoning attacks. It produces RRSIG records.
55. Session hijacking is an attack where the attacker steals cookies from your computer system.
56. If you type your URL incorrectly, you could be redirected to a fraudulent website; this is known as typo-squatting.

2. Port security disables the ports and reduces the functionality of the switch, however, 802.1x authenticates the device, so the ports remain open with rogue devices being prevented access.
3. Using IPSec between servers uses transport mode, but when IPSec is used over the internet, it uses tunnel mode.
4. A stateful firewall inspects incoming traffic down to the commands used and packet sizes and would realize that the three-way handshake is not being established and would prevent the SYN flood attack.

5. The role of the VPN concentrator is to set up the secure session for the VPN connection.
6. We would install a load balancer to deal with the vast amount of web traffic and we would set up affinity in the regions with limited bandwidth with all of the requests going to the same web server.
7. The best way to deal with a high volume of DDoS traffic is to use as a firewall to prevent this traffic entering your network.
8. DNS round robin can be used to balance web traffic as it rotates through the A records. The pitfall is that it does not know the status of the web server.
9. To capture commands going across the network, we need to use a packet sniffer, also known as a protocol analyzer.
10. A UDP port needs to be used for streaming video; TCP would be far too slow as it uses a three-way handshake.
11. To discover information such as the patch level version of a web server, we would use banner grabbing. Common tools for banner grabbing include telnet, nmap, or netcat (nc).
12. Nmap and NIDS can both identify when a new host enters your network.
13. A SIEM system should be implemented as it does real-time monitoring and can use an aggregation engine to identify attacks across the network.
14. To fulfill the policy, the security should store the security logs in a WORM drive (Write Once Read Many); this allows files to be copied to the drive but not altered or deleted.
15. Two tools that can identify an established session is the Windows command-line tool netstat and the Linux tool called netcat, also known as nc.
16. Security monitoring tools cannot analyze data if it is in an encrypted format.
17. A proxy filter has a URL filter to block access to certain websites, content filter to stop access to gaming websites, and web page caching to provide faster and more secure access to web pages. It cannot cache the stock exchange as the data is too volatile.
18. A reverse proxy authenticates incoming connections and decrypts incoming traffic so that the inline NIPS can monitor it.
19. A mobile telephone uses over-the-air updates where, ideally, the phone should have a full battery or be connected to a power socket.

20. A smartphone could be used to record a conversation and take videos and pictures of sensitive and private information.
21. To keep your business data separate from your personal data, you would use storage segmentation, also known as containerization, to isolate the data from other data. This could be in the format of installing a micro SD card into the phone.
22. Using a **Virtual Desktop Infrastructure (VDI)** environment, the contractors would have an isolated desktop, depending on the network connections assigned to it. If they were to test applications, they could be sandboxed inside of their virtual machines.
23. Using a download manager would state how many connections are allowed and the amount of bandwidth that they are allowed to use.
24. You would first of all have to carry out carrier unlocking, known as jailbreaking, and then use a technique called sideloading to load the third-party software. This would not prevent you from using the Apple Store.

1. Answer: c

Concept: When there is no allow rule in either a firewall or router, the incoming traffic gets the last rule, which is deny all. This is known as implicit deny.

2. Answer: e

Concept: Enabling port security on the switch blocks all connections to the wall jack as the port is turned off.

3. Answer: b

Concept: **Network Access Control (NAC)** checks that clients are patched, and this occurs after the authentication process. A non-compliant machine that is unpatched is placed in a quarantine or boundary network where the required updates are obtained from a remediation server. In this case, there is no way to obtain updates. Therefore, once the client has been authenticated, there will be a host health check and if the client is not patched, the connection will drop.

4. Answer: b

Concept: When additional switches are added to the network, you must ensure that there is loop protection by using the spanning tree protocol. If this is not done, then there will be broadcasting between switches, known as looping, which will slow the traffic down. Spanning tree will have some ports forward, block or listen for traffic to prevent looping.

5. Answer: c

Concept: **Near Field Communication (NFC)** is a contactless payment method over a distance of 4 inches or 10 centimeters.

6. Answer: d

Concept: The purpose of the VPN concentrator is to create the secure sessions for VPN connections.

7. Answer: b and c

Concept: `netstat -an` is a Microsoft product that will show connections and `netcat`, normally known as `nc`, shows established connection as it is a Unix open source utility.

Concept: If you put your voice traffic, also known as videoconferencing, into its own VLAN, it is separated from the rest of the network and bandwidth will be guaranteed. This will result in better quality videoconferencing.

Concept: POP3 is a legacy version of email that does not keep a copy on the server. Upgrading will allow the mail administrator to backup the emails that remain on the mail server.

Concept: A hardened operating system has no vulnerabilities. The SIEM system is giving the wrong information; this is known as a false positive. SIEM systems measure different types of packets using a separate input filter for each, and using the incorrect filter will produce false positives.

Concept: Context-aware authentication can be set up so that the devices only operate in the UK and if someone tried to use them in another country, the device would be disabled.

Concept: DNS round robin is a technique where the web requests are rotated through each DNS record for web servers balancing the incoming requests.

Concept: The best ways of destroying paper data, from best to worst, are burning, pulping, then shredding.

Concept: The company has a license compliance violation as all software is licensed and using more copies of software than the licenses that you purchase is breaking the law.

Concept: A honeypot is a website made to look like a legitimate website with lowered security so that security teams can monitor the attack methods being used, then they can mitigate the risk. A number of honeypots is called a honeynet.

Concept: When the SSID is disabled, the SSID can be attached to the packet header. Both a SSID decloak device and a wireless scanner/wireless packet sniffer can capture the SSID from the packet.

Concept: Voice traffic operates on a protocol called Real Time Protocol and the secure version is **Secure Real-Time Protocol (SRTP)**.

Concept: A wireless scanner can capture packets from and to the wireless access point, so that they can troubleshoot where the problem is arising. They will also be able to see rejected packets.

1. Prior to creating policies, companies should look at all regulations and frameworks to ensure that they comply with them.
2. COBIT and ITIL are non-regulatory and not legally enforceable as they are both good practice frameworks.

3. Purchasing broadband from two different companies provides vendor diversity, therefore, if one company fails, then the other still provides broadband.
4. The boundary layer between the LAN and the WAN is called the DMZ; it hosts the extranet web server that is normally used for suppliers and needs credentials to access it.
5. If a laptop had sensitive information such as research and development data, the IT team could isolate it from the network by air gapping it so nobody could connect to it.
6. When full disk encryption such as BitLocker is used on a laptop, the laptop needs to have either a TPM chip or an HSM to store the encryption keys.
7. An IT security team would roll out a honeypot when they want to observe the attack methods being used by an attacker. The benefits would be to enable them to defend against such an attack.
8. A network administrator would use a load balancer to balance the website traffic so that each request would go to the least utilized host, but would use a firewall to prevent the DDoS traffic from entering the company network.
9. A site-to-site VPN is a solution that can connect two different locations as long as it is set to always on; this is a much cheaper solution than a leased line.
10. Port mirroring or a tap can capture traffic going to a port on a switch and display it on another device for analysis.
11. The role of the VPN concentrator is to set up a secure session.
12. If I am using full disk encryption, the trust model being used is known as a hardware root of trust.
13. Standard operating procedures are the step-by-step instructions on how to carry out a task.
14. The company would set this laptop up so that it is air gapped—that would isolate it from the network.
15. You would create four VLANs and put each company in its own VLAN, therefore, isolating them from each other. This would give control to each VLAN and reduce the broadcast domains.
16. If an application will not run or install, it is simply because it has not been added to the whitelist; it does not necessarily need to be on the blacklist. The blacklist is for applications that will never be installed as they are banned.

17. The most common threat to printers and multifunction devices would be the network interface as most devices are now fully connected.
18. Sandboxing is where an isolated virtual machine can be used for patching, testing, or isolation of a dangerous application, therefore, the research and development department would put it in a sandbox.
19. The temperature rise is due to the additional increase in computers but it looks like they have not set up the hot aisles and cold aisles to regulate the temperature.
20. The professor has failed to change the default username or the default password of each of these devices, leaving himself vulnerable to attack.
21. A refrigerator comes under the category of IoT and the defibrillator comes under the category SoC.
22. Errors that are customer-facing should be bland, giving away very little information, whereas the errors for the IT team should be as long and detailed as possible. Errors should not cause a system to stop.
23. Both the black box and white box penetration testers use fuzzing, a technique that puts random information into an application to see what random output it provides. The white box tester is doing this with newly developed applications so that they are secure before moving into production.
24. The first technique to mask data would be obfuscation as it obscures the data; the second technique for embedding data would be steganography as it hides data inside other data.
25. The best method for preventing a SQL injection attack would be to use a stored procedure where a sealed script is created and run by using the script name. The secondary way to prevent SQL injection would be input validation where the input is controlled.
26. A zero-day virus cannot be detected by any monitoring system or antivirus solution; it can only be detected by using a baseline where an earlier baseline is compared to the current baseline.
27. The benefit of using a machine template or an imaging package such as a ghost to image a computer is that it produces a consistent baseline.
28. An immutable system is where the complete components are replaced rather than updated, therefore, it would never be patched as it would be fully replaced.
29. The only cloud model that allows you to host bespoke systems in the cloud and maintain them is **Platform as a service (PaaS)**. An example would be Azure.

30. Software as a service is where a vendor writes an application and then leases it but customization is forbidden. Examples would be Spotify or Office 365.
31. Type I hypervisors are bare metal and require no operating system, whereas a Type II hypervisor sits on top of an operating system, for example, Oracle's VirtualBox.
32. If the US Army decided to move all of their systems to the cloud, they would adopt a private cloud where they would own the whole environment and be isolated from everyone else due to security.

If an IT training company needed an environment for a word-processing course, they would lease little resources from the cloud provider but if they required a Skype or SharePoint environment, they could lease high-end servers—all they have to do is to send the image to the cloud provider, who would roll it out.

35. The staging phase in SDLC is where the application is tested with production data.
36. Waterfall is where one stage must be completed fully before the next stage commences. Agile can start all phases at the same time; its main aim is customer satisfaction. It is very similar to scrum.
37. A camera is a physical device that can capture both pictures and video, therefore, capturing motion and providing non-repudiation as the person is captured on film.
38. A Faraday cage can be built over a WLAN, preventing emissions from escaping and blocking incoming wireless communications.
39. The company is adopting key management where they ensure that all keys are accounted for and do not leave the premises so keys cannot be cut.
40. Protected distribution or conduits can be used to house cabling and prevent them from being attacked by rodents.

Concept: When a computer or device is air gapped, it is not connected to the network.

Concept: A baseline is a list of installed applications, updates, and settings. If a baseline had been used, everyone would have the same settings.

Concept: A honeypot allows the security administrator to attract potential attackers and monitor the attack method being utilized.

# Chapter 5: Cryptography and PKI Practice Tests

## Practice Test 17 – Solution

1. Encryption takes plaintext and turns it into unreadable ciphertext.
2. A wildcard certificate can be used on multiple servers in the same domain. Therefore, when you install it, the name of the server will be inserted into the X509.
3. The old private key is required to decrypt the data. Keys work in pairs and the old public key encrypted the data, therefore, he needs the corresponding private key to decrypt it.
4. A digital signature provides non-repudiation and integrity of the email. He needs to sign it with his private key. There is only one private key.
5. A digital signature provides both integrity, so you know that it has not been tampered with, and non-repudiation as it was signed using the one and only private key.
6. The best form of encryption for small mobile devices is to use **Elliptic Curve Cryptography (ECC)** as it has a small footprint and uses the Diffie Hellman handshake.
7. ECC is never used on a military mobile device, instead, AES-256 is used.
8. The two main key stretching algorithms are BCrypt and PBKDF2.
9. The **Object Identifier (OID)** is the equivalent of a serial number embedded into the certificate.
10. The Hardware Security Module is used by the Key Escrow to securely store and manage the private keys. It can also be used with a laptop instead of using a TPM chip for FDE.
11. A key stretching algorithm appends random characters to a stored password; this prevents the storage of duplicate passwords and with additional characters, it will slow down a brute force attack.
12. Hashing is a technique that is used to confirm the integrity of data. The data is hashed, producing a hash value; if the same data is hashed at a later stage and the hash values match, you then know that the integrity of the data is intact. Otherwise, it has been tampered with.

13. The only way to protect data in transit between two entities is to use encryption; this way, the data cannot be viewed or tampered with.
14. Hashing provides data integrity; the two hashing algorithms used on the Security+ exam are SHA1 – 160 bits and MD5 – 128 bits.
15. You should tell the CEO that hashing is a one-way function and it not reversible.
16. A POODLE attack is a man-in-the-middle attack that uses a downgraded version of SSL 3.0 using CBC. Today, we use TLS, which is more secure.
17. DHE and ECDHE are called ephemeral keys; these are short-lived one-time use keys. A new key is used for each session.
18. To protect data on a laptop, we are going to use full disk encryption where the whole drive is encrypted. The laptop will need either a TPM chip or an HSM. Outside of the Security+ exam, an example would be BitLocker, but in the exam, it is known as FDE.
19. To protect data at rest on a mobile telephone, we are going to use **Elliptic Curve Cryptography (ECC)**. It has a small footprint and is great for small devices.
20. The data stored on a backend server is stored on a database such as SQL or Oracle. This would, therefore, use database encryption.
21. The key that the **Certificate Authority (CA)** uses is known as the root key; the CA uses this key to sign the new X509 certificates.
22. When a company does not want to use a third-party external CA, it will use an internal CA using private certificates. The downside of this is that the company needs to build the certificate server and have the in-house skillset to manage it.
23. You would need to implement full device encryption to protect the data on small devices such as smartphones and external or USB drives. The abbreviation for it is FDE.
24. If your company is selling goods to external businesses, they must purchase their certificates from a third-party CA. These are trusted by everyone.
25. If your company is handling military or confidential data, the CA will only be powered up for the issue of new certificates, otherwise, it is powered down and locked up in a secure room to prevent an attack on it.
26. The person who designs and builds the CA and the intermediary authorities is known as the architect.

27. The cyber team should use certificate pinning, which is used to prevent compromise of a CA or someone creating fraudulent certificates.
28. In a Public Key Infrastructure, the CA is responsible for signing the X509 certificates using the root key.
29. When two PKI environments want to trust each other, this is called a bridge of trust model; in the Security+ exam, it is simply known as a trust model.
30. PGP uses a web of trust model and it is used between two people.
31. When FDE is being used and the keys are stored in either a TPM chip or an HSM, it is known as a hardware root of trust model.
32. You should tell him that the validity of certificates is done by the **Certificate Revocation List (CRL)**. If you do not have internet, you would most probably have a local CRL.
33. If certificate validation is going slow, it means that the CRL is struggling; in this case, you would use a more modern and faster version called the OCSP.
34. Certificate stapling is where a web server bypasses the CRL and goes directly to the OCSP for faster certificate validation.
35. The process for renewing a certificate is called a Certificate Signing Request. Two keys are generated, the public key is sent away, and an X509 certificate is returned.
36. The Key Escrow is responsible for holding the private keys for third-parties. The Key Escrow stores the certificates in an HSM. The HSM secures and manages the certificates.
37. Symmetric encryption such as DES, 3 DES, AES, Twofish, and Blowfish have small single keys known as the private or shared keys. They use block ciphers so that they can encrypt a large amount of data very quickly.
38. When someone's private key has become corrupt, they cannot decrypt data. The DRA then obtains another copy of the private key from the Key Escrow so that they can decrypt the data.
39. A private key is easily identified as it has a P12 format and has a .pfx extension. It looks like a certificate being placed inside an envelope. It is the only key protected by a password.
40. A public key is easily identified as it has a P7B format and has a .cer extension. It looks like a picture of a certificate. It cannot be protected by a password.

41. Extended validation has a higher level of trust than a normal certificate. When someone visits a website that has this certificate, either the background or the URL letters turn green depending on the browser used.
42. Diffie Hellman is an asymmetric technique that sets up the secure tunnel for the L2TP/IPSec VPN. It does not encrypt data; this is done by the ESP encryption algorithms.
43. A SAN certificate can be installed on multiple domains, you can also add the DNS server or IP Address into the certificate.
44. When the developer has written new software, it should be code signed to prove that it is the original software and not a fake.
45. Block ciphers put data in blocks and stream cipher the data is transferred in bits, therefore, encrypting data using block ciphers is much quicker.
46. L2TP/IPSec has three encryption algorithms in the ESP. These are DES 56 bit, 3DES 168 bit, and AES 256 bit. The strongest is AES and the weakest is DES. The smaller the key, the faster it is, but the larger the key, the more secure it is.
47. The first stage of any encryption in the Security+ exam, whether it is asymmetric or symmetric encryption is to exchange keys.
48. When Bill is encrypting data to send to Ben, he should have first of all, already exchanged public keys. Therefore, Bill will use Ben's public key to encrypt the data.
49. James and Ben must first of all have a key pair as PGP is asymmetric then they should then exchange public keys.
50. To be able to set up PGP, each person needs a key pair.
51. When a certificate is giving an untrusted error, the certificate should be checked to ensure that it has not expired, and if it is valid, then we need to ensure it is added to the Trusted Root Certification Authorities on the computer where the certificate is installed.

## Chapter 6: Risk Management

1. The auditor is measuring the Recovery Point Objective, the amount of downtime a company can endure without causing damage to its sales or reputation.
2. The IT manager has been measuring the **Mean Time Between Failures (MTBF)** so that he can see, over a period of time, the number of times the video-conferencing application has been crashing. This measures the reliability.
3. The **Mean Time to Repair (MTTR)** lets you know how long it took a system to be repaired and the **Recovery Time Objective (RTO)** is when a system is back to operational state; they both inform you when the system is working.
4. The quality of how the risk is measured by the Qualitative Risk Assessment can be graded as high, medium, or low.
5. The Quantitative Risk Assessment is normally measured by giving the risk a value to measure the risk.
6. This is known as a single point of failure, where one component fails and takes down a system.
7. The most critical factor measuring Business Impact Analysis is the loss of life.
8. When employing someone, the human resources department must carry out a background check to ensure that they are who they say they are and they have no criminal record. For finance positions, they will also credit check them.
9. An exit interview is carried out by the human resources department to discover the reason why an employee leaves and to see how they can improve working conditions to ensure that they retain good employees.

10. A business partnership agreement lays out the contributions of each partner, which partner will make certain decisions so that they both know where they stand who decides which decisions so that they both know where they stand.
11. A service level agreement is needed for printer maintenance. This is measured in metrics, for example, did they meet the agreement 99% of the time.
12. When you outsource the maintenance of your printers this is called risk transference.
13. A MOU is more than a gentleman's agreement, but a MOA is legally binding.
14. The first stage in risk assessment is to classify the asset; this will then determine how it is handled, stored, and protected. Just think how differently you would treat gold from trash.
15. The first stage the financial director should do is to enforce mandatory vacations and send Mary on holiday. At that time, the financial consultant can log in to her system and have a thorough investigation.
16. They are adopting a clean desk policy, where they clear all paper from their desks. It should really be called a clear desk policy as nobody is interested in how clean the desk is.
17. **Mandatory Access Control (MAC)** is based on the classification of the data; the only person who really knows the classification is the data owner, the person who wrote the document.
18. A data custodian is responsible for storing and backing up of data; he is not authorized to give anyone access to it.
19. A contractor who is a member of the IT team such as a service technician would need either an administrative or privileged account.
20. Prior to starting penetration testing, the tester must establish what he should do when he discovers a vulnerability: does he just report it or exploit it as far as he can go?
21. When Ariadne brought her personal laptop into the company, the IT team should have carried out the on boarding policy and at that point, the virus would have been discovered.
22. A job rotation policy is aimed at, first of all, training staff and then discovering whether fraud or theft has occurred.
23. The cashier is not allowed to carry out the whole transaction herself without the Financial Director, which means that they are adopting separation of duties where no one person can carry out the whole transaction.

24. Each department head should document any risk that affects their department and how the risk should be treated. This should be reviewed annually.
25. When the risk seems too high, we would treat it with risk avoidance.
26. Outsourcing the Skype environment to a third party is known as risk transference.
27. Two technical controls that would be used to mitigate risk on a new laptop would be to activate the host-based firewall and install an antivirus solution.
28. The IT manager is adopting risk acceptance as there are rarely (if any) hurricanes and tornadoes in Scotland. This risk is deemed extremely low.
29. He will either write a new policy for the new technology or complete change management on the existing policy.
30. A standard operating procedure is where a company takes a task that needs to be carried out and sets out step-by-step instructions on how to carry out that task and by whom.
31. The purpose of using SLE, ARO, and ALE is to put a monetary value on items that are lost. SLE is the value of losing one item, the ARO is the number of losses a year, and the ALE, the annual loss, is when both of these are multiplied. As long as you have two values, the other can be calculated. For example,  $SLE \times ARO = ALE$  or  $ALE / ARO = SLE$ .
32. When John Smith began employment, he would have been given the acceptable use policy on using email. In the policy, it would have been stipulated that company email cannot be used for personal email. By sending out this email, he has violated the AUP.
33. Before the forensic investigator starts to analyze the laptop, he must take a system image and place it on another computer, keeping the original intact so that it can be produced in court. Secondly, on the system image, he should hash the data prior to his investigation and then re-hash it at the end and when both values match, he can prove to the judge that the data has not been tampered with.
34. Before the forensic investigator starts to analyze an external hard drive, he must take a forensic copy then place it on another computer, keeping the original intact so that it can be produced in court. He would also hash the data before and after to prove integrity.
35. The chain of custody documents who has collected evidence and who has handled it until it is produced in court as evidence. Once the evidence has left the sight of the personnel who last signed for it, the chain of custody has been broken.

36. His mailbox should be placed on legal hold sometimes called Litigation Hold; this will then mean emails can be sent and received, but cannot be deleted or destroyed and then can be presented as evidence.
37. The first stage of discovering a web-based attack would be to capture the network traffic to identify the attacker as this is the most volatile evidence. Simply stopping the attack stops you from finding out who the perpetrator is.
38. If a rapidly expanding virus is attacking your company network, you need to immediately stop the attack. The time taken to capture the network traffic would allow the virus to be spread all over your network. This is the only case when you must stop it from spreading rather than capture the volatile evidence.
39. When the security administrator discovers that one of the company computers is a member of a botnet, it should be turned off immediately, taken from the network, and re-imaged; this is to prevent it from attacking anyone else. He then should investigate how it happened to prevent another occurrence.
40. The record time offset is the regional time that evidence has been collected. In the case of multinational investigations, it then can put into a sequence with evidence collected in other countries using time normalization. All times may be converted into GMT so a trail of evidence can be established.
41. A snapshot can be taken before a major upgrade so that if the upgrade fails the virtual machine can be rolled back to the original state. The CompTIA exam measures a snapshot as the fastest backup, when in fact, it should be deemed the fastest recovery.
42. The fastest physical backup is a full backup. A full backup is the last full backup, but both incremental and differential backups start with a full backup then replay the differential or the number of incremental backups required.
43. The most expensive disaster recovery site is a hot site as it is fully manned and operation with data with the data up to date.
44. The cheapest disaster recovery site is a cold site as it only has power and water and no equipment.
45. Data sovereignty means that data cannot be stored outside of the region it was created in. In the exam it could also mean country, data must reside within the country where it was created.
46. If your company is backing up data using backup tapes, they must ensure that the tapes are clearly labeled and that the latest backup is taken offsite.

47. For a business selling theater tickets, they must use a hot site for disaster recovery.
48. A cloud-based disaster recovery site can be up and running faster than any other site because all you need is an internal connection; even with a hot site, a company needs to move all of the people to that hot site and that may take some time.
49. A cold site would be the cheapest disaster recovery site as it would only have power and water. There would be no equipment and it may take some time to become operational.
50. Risk is the probability that an event will happen that would cause some loss to the company.

Concept: The first stage in risk assessment is to identify or classify the asset. This classification determines its value and how it should be handled or treated.

30. Answer: a

Concept: When destroying hard drives, the best way is to shred the hard drive—some turn the hard drive into powder. The next best is to pulverize followed by degaussing.

31. Answer: b and d

Concept: The ARO is calculated by dividing the ALE by the SLE. The ALE is calculated by multiplying the SLE/ARO.

32. Answer: c

Concept: Job rotation has two purposes—the first is to ensure that all staff can perform more than one job and the second is to help to detect fraud and theft. If they had adopted job rotation, someone else would have had experience of being a mail administrator.

33. Answer: b and c

Concept: A risk register includes all of the company's risk, a risk owner, the value of the asset, and the risk treatment.

34. Answer: d

Concept: A mantrap is a turnstile type device that only allows one person to enter or leave the data center, making it a safe and contained environment. The exam likes protecting a data center by using a mantrap.

35. Answer: b

Concept: All scans will show details of the host and the date/time of the scan. A normal vulnerability scan will find missing patches. These are known as passive, also non-credentialed has minimal rights. Whenever passive and non-credentialed are in the same question, choose the latter.

36. Answer: c

Concept: A hacktivist is politically motivated.

37. Answer: d

Concept: Legal hold on a mailbox prevents the emails from being deleted but allows the person under investigation to still send and receive email.

38. Answer: d

Concept: The dark web is a place where illegal dealing occurs including selling of unauthorized programs and tools that are likely to cause damage.

39. Answer: e

Concept: A new intern is most likely as they are untrained users and the most likely to fall victim to a spear phishing attack.

40. Answer: d

Concept: Pulverizing is a better way to destroy a hard drive than degaussing. Burning and pulping could not be carried out.

41. Answer: d

Concept: A table-top exercise is a hypothetical exercise and is an easy way to walk through a disaster recovery plan.

42. Answer: b

Concept: A full backup is the fastest physical backup. All backups start with a full backup. A snapshot is the fastest restore and has the ability to roll back, but is used in a virtual environment. An incremental backup uses a full back up and the number of incremental tapes since that backup. A differential backup uses the full backup and the latest differential, tape, always using two tapes.

43. Answer: b

Concept: Collecting information from social media websites will be used to target a single person. This is how social engineering is carried out.

44. Answer: c

Concept: A credentialed scan is a passive scan that can provide information from a system and audit files. A non-credentialed and passive scan is limited to missing patches and the IP Address and time of scan. The Microsoft Baseline Analyzer is a credentialed scan.

45. Answer: c

Concept: Replication of data between countries is illegal. Data must stay within regions. In the Security+ exam, it could be countries rather than regions.

46. Answer: d

Concept: Active reconnaissance is where someone has entered a system. In the preceding cases, they had accessed the systems registry and the operating system files.

47. Answer: c

Concept: A compensating control means something different than what is being used.

48. Answer: c

Concept: A DLP template is an XML template with a pattern match inside. When DLP is used, any email matching that pattern match will be blocked. DLP can also be used to prevent data being stolen by USB.

49. Answer: d

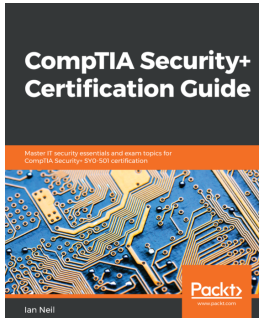
Concept: When troubleshooting virus attacks, use the mnemonic IP. I = Identify the virus, then isolate/quarantine. Next is P = Preparation stage – apply a solution – or mitigate (delete). In this preceding example, we have no virus name, therefore, we have not identified it. We would then run a virus scan to identify the virus.

Answer: Technical controls normally mitigate risk. Antivirus prevents virus attacks, screen saver locks your desktop after a period of time, and firewall rules control what traffic flows in and out of the desktop

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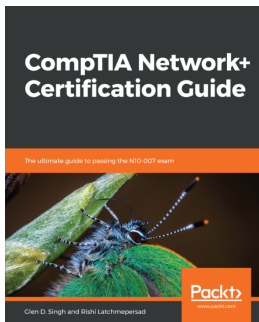
